The International Conference of Symphony and Opera Musicians (ICSOM) is pleased to announce that Douglas Rosenthal will be the host of its monthly video series "Musician Profiles: Celebrating Racial Diversity" for the 2024–25 season.

Appointed associate principal trombonist of the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra in 2023, Douglas Rosenthal served as the ICSOM delegate of the Kennedy Center Opera House Orchestra in Washington, DC while he was assistant principal trombonist. During his time in DC, Douglas participated in union and community activism, serving on the Executive Board for AFM Local 161-710 (DC Federation of Musicians) and as a delegate to the Metropolitan Washington AFL-CIO and DC Jobs with Justice.

Launched in June 2022 and originally hosted by ICSOM President Paul Austin, ICSOM's "Musician Profiles: Celebrating Racial Diversity" series focuses upon ICSOM Musicians of Color, their experiences, and how they view the need for racial diversity within our orchestras.
